

### The Imperishable Inheritance

(John 20: 19 - 31)

Thomas' challenge to his friends was graphic and harsh. If Jesus had indeed returned, he wanted to see the marks of his crucifixion. And Thomas got his wish, though he certainly hadn't counted on it.

Many bear the marks of crucifixion as they make their way through the world. The abused child, the jaded adult, the dying elder all show signs of the suffering they endure. We can, like Thomas, reach out and finger these wounds in others if we doubt their existence. But more useful is the healing touch Jesus demonstrated on so many occasions in his ministry. We may not have a miraculous gift for healing, but we do have within our grasp the capacity to kiss; hold a hand; spend some time; speak a word of kindness. The sheer amount of suffering in the world can overwhelm us and lead to inaction. But a Christian has a clear calling to the signs of suffering in others. With the cross as our inheritance, we know even wounds can be alorified.

#### Pray

Risen Christ, like yours, the wounds of our hearts remain – but some no longer bleed. May we never hesitate to allow others to probe them so they might come to deeper faith in you. Amen.

#### **Ponder**

Contemplate in prayer the marks of crucifixion in your neighbourhood, parish, school, or city. Consider assisting a group which addresses these concerns in any way your resources allow.

#### Kids' Corner

When doubting Thomas touched Jesus, he swiftly became aware of Jesus' identity and the reality of his Resurrection. Jesus loved Thomas, despite Thomas' pressing doubt, but praised those who believe without seeing him. Jesus is referring to us, the people of the Church who would never see or touch his wounds, but would believe in his life, death, and Resurrection. Doubt is part of a living faith. Sometimes we have to pray through them until Jesus offers us his peace. Do you know anyone who might be experiencing it right now? Keep praying for the peace of Christ, and seek and offer support.

Thank you, Jesus, for loving us through our fears and doubts. Amen. - www.gpbs.com.au

# **Divine Mercy Sunday**

In the Jubilee Year, Pope John Paul II established the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. Popularised by twentieth century Polish nun, St Faustina, devotion to the Divine Mercy is gaining momentum. In a world where so many struggle to live faithful lives, the promises of Divine Mercy are truly a beacon of hope. Officially established as a permanent feast on April 30, 2000, the Feast of Divine Mercy is relatively unknown among Christians.

The feast was brought to prominence by the writings of St Faustina who in the 1930's recorded a diary that documented the words and instructions she received from a series of visions of Christ. Her diary is full of Jesus' urgent desire to communicate the depths of his mercy for humankind. It is the promise of the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment for any soul that would go to Confession and then



receive Jesus in Holy Communion on that very special Feast of Divine Mercy! For some simple ideas to celebrate and incorporate the Divine Mercy into your family life, check out this this article.

# It's now time to return your Project Compassion Box.


Bring your box or envelope to Mass any time before the end of April.
