### **Whispered Words**

(Matthew 10: 26 - 33)

Jesus says to fear no one; but I run out of fingers counting the people and situations that cause fear and anxiety in my life. I want to believe with the certainty of Paul, but often I find myself keeping company with Jeremiah, worried to a frazzle. Is it that I doubt God is



going to get me out of the latest scrape I'm in (Yes.) Is it that God has given me reason to doubt that I will be rescued? (No.) So what's the problem?

The problem is me, not God. God keeps track of the hairs on my head and the fate of every sparrow, but I'm keeping the log of everything that can and does go wrong with frail mortality. People go broke. People get sick. People die. These things are often more compelling to me than God's domination over creation. Jesus reminds us that the body is not as important as the soul, but I have grown very fond of the body and have spent a lifetime preserving it. Still, I crawl up on the rooftop of hope every once in a while and warble faintly about what I've heard and believe, despite all uncertainty, to be true. When I speak this truth, its certainty grows in me. When I act on this truth, I'm brought into the light.

### Pray

Patient God, it's true: we don't want you to disrupt our peace. Too often, we don't let you interrupt our comfort and complacency. We like things the way they are. We like living based on the economy of this world, rather than your economy of love. Too often we choose the easy road. We wonder: What are you seeking to teach us? What are we to learn from you? Too much of our lives is spent doubting you, instead of living into your beautiful reminder that we are heard, known, and loved. For this, we say sorry, forgive. Amen.

#### **Ponder**

Describe the last occasion you had to speak or act in faith. How did this witness make your faith stronger? Pray this week like Jeremiah, bringing the lovely and unlovely parts of your heart to God.

### Kids' Corner

When you hear the word "champion," what do you think of? Probably someone who is the best at something, right? But "champion" has another meaning too. To be another person's "champion" means you support them. You stand up for them, no matter what. Our mightiest champion is God. Whether we win or lose or make a big mistake, God is there, behind and beside us. Even when it seems like the rest of the world has forgotten or dismissed us, God stays close, reminding us that we are God's prized children.

### Don't Let Fear Threaten Your Character

I remember being afraid in high school.
I remember fearing the bullies. I remember fearing rejection as I looked for friends.
I remember fearing humiliation when I asked girls for a date. Sadly, I did some stupid things out of fear, some things that hurt my character.

Fear is real, but it doesn't have to control us because God cares enough to stand by us through it all. That's the good news from this week's Gospel.



Early Christians also struggled with fear. Remember, they were Jewish and saw Jesus as the fulfilment of all Jewish hopes. That belief put them in conflict with other Jews, who eventually kicked those early Christians out of their communities. Read the Acts of the Apostles of Paul's letters. You'll find some hair-raising stories about the persecutions they faced.

Nonetheless, they persevered. They believed that Jesus' teachings helped them grow closer to God. So they developed strong worship lives that soothed and strengthened their souls. They devoted themselves to helping one another. All this, they found, brought them God's strength – strength that helped them face rejection and brutality.

That strength can be yours. Call upon it. It's scary to risk your popularity, to challenge bullies, to stand against bigotry and dishonesty, and to stand up for the little ones and those who live on the margins. You are likely to face rejection and maybe even physical attack. But you build so much character when you take those risks. Those risks strengthen your character.

Follow the example of those early Christians. Make Mass and acts of justice and service important in your life. They will protect your soul and calm your fears. You will find, as Jesus says, that God watches you closely, always looking for ways to help you out.

## Family Centered, Parish Based, School/Catechist Supported Sacramental Programs

(From the Archdiocese of Sale)

A balanced approach to growth in faith is achieved when family, parish and school each recognise and carry out their particular role. In all of this we recognise that it is the child who is the focus.

### What FAMILIES do to help their children grow in faith

Education in the faith already happens when family members help one another to grow in faith by the witness of a Christian life in keeping with the Gospel.

In families, children:

- Learn who they are and that they are loved
- First experience celebration and forgiveness in family life
- Share meals and talk together about happenings in their lives
- Learn to celebrate achievements and to support each other in difficult times
- Are introduced to: the parish community who gather for Sunday Eucharist Scripture stories about Jesus through prayers in the home.

The focus for parents and family members is to show children, in practical ways, how to live good lives.

### What PARISHES do to help children grow in faith

All the sacraments are sacred links uniting the faithful with one another. Through on-going experiences in parish life children:

- Experience a sense of belonging to the local parish and to the wider community of believers
- Experience a sense of the sacred and a sense of the wonder of God
- Are challenged to hear the Word of God, celebrate it and live it as Christians in the world
- Meet people who are enabled to live out the Gospel in a variety of pastoral ministries

The focus for the parish community is to invite all to share in the life of the community, and recognise there are times when a unique response is called for to support a child in their faith journey.

### What SCHOOLS and CATECHISTS do to help children grow in faith

The Catholic school is a community of faith sustained by the word of God, a meeting place with Christ and communion with all. The focus for the school is not merely to provide a formal education in faith but nurture young people in an environment that leads them to develop their personal relationship with God.

The focus for catechist groups is to support children and families in the parish sacrament process and provide Religious Education to young people not attending Catholic schools.

During this time of preparation we pray for the families and teachers guiding the children on this sacramental journey.

### **World Refugee Day – Finding Freedom**



Tuesday, 20 June 2023 was World Refugee Day and I was fortunate to attend the Canberra Refugee Support presentation of Education Awards. The Award Ceremony was held at Cook Community Hall and about 30 refugees were presented with education awards. Recipients had been nominated by a range of institutions and the guest speaker, Mr Nai Jit Lam, Deputy Regional Representative UNHCR spoke of the plight of refugees and asylum seekers throughout the world.

I had been invited because two of Estellinee's (a parishioner) eight children, had been nominated for an education award. The two children arrived with their elder brother last April from Tanzania where they had spent seven years in a refugee camp as

unaccompanied minors. Their mother was Estellinee's deceased sister and Estellinee had assured her while she was alive, that if anything happened to her sister, she would look after her children. Sadly their mother was killed in Burundi and Estellinee fulfilled her promise.

In announcing each Award, the representative from the nominating organisation said where the person was from, told a little about their story and why the person had been nominated. It was extremely moving as we learnt of the hardship that many children, women, men and families face when leaving their country of origin and how they are settling in Australia.
