

A Walk on the Wild Side

(Matthew 14: 22 - 33)

Peter was a fisherman. He was long accustomed to the sea and its moods, and surely this was not the first stormy night he'd spent on the water. Peter knew how to compensate for wind and waves in choppy weather. He also knew there was a point beyond which negotiation with a tempest was impossible. But Peter had no experience at all with a ghost, or a man, walking on the waves. Like the others in the boat, he was afraid. But like the others, he was willing to negotiate with this new situation. Peter decided to take a walk on the wild side.

A fisherman who stays with his boat knows how to ride a wave. But with wind at his back and water under his feet, all Peter had for support was the steady view of his Lord. As his consciousness of the peril grew, his confidence in the Lord shrank. Many of us too have lost our faith in time of crisis. Our trust in God is steady within the boat, and up for grabs when life is less predictable. Peter scores points for risking a walk on the wild side, which the rest of the disciples were unwilling to do. An untested faith is worse than the "little faith" Peter showed. God can always plant a mustard seed.

When has your faith been tested by stormy events? How did your faith endure?

Pray

God of endings and new beginnings, we encounter you amidst a broken world. You invite us into these spaces of brokenness – into these cracks, through which the light shines. Thank you for the gift of your presence, even though the difficulty of the unknown and uncomfortable. Amen.

Ponder

Walk in faith, even if it means getting out of the safe boat you've been sailing lately. Take a risk: give charitably beyond what's comfortable. Tell the truth even if it costs you. Pray through your doubts. "Courage, it's me. Don't be afraid!"

Kids' Corner

Here's how it went when you learned to ride a bike: You were pedalling along just fine until you realised that nobody was holding on. Did you crash then? Keep going? Following Jesus is a little bit like that too. Luckily, we don't have to do it on our own. Jesus will never let go!

World Youth Day 2023



The Holy Spirit was alive and active in Portugal this past week, with 1.5 million pilgrims gathering in Lisbon for World Youth Day's Final Mass.

The Pope encouraged those gathered to let Jesus be the light in their life so they might bring that light to others. He calls on young people to shine, to listen, and to be unafraid.

"We do not become luminous when we focus the spotlight on ourselves," he said. "We become luminous, we shine, when, welcoming Jesus, we learn to love like Him. To love like Jesus: that makes us luminous, that leads us to do works of love."

We pray for all of those who gathered at World Youth Day, and who are now making their way back to their communities back home. May they bring some of the light of the event with them to share with the rest of us.







Trip to Sabah 2023 (21st June - 4th July 2023)

Recently my daughter Kate and I joined Gordet and Jane Maan on a trip to Sabah in Borneo. We did sightseeing things, and were very impressed by the fact that a lot of Kota Kinabalu (the capital) is built on land reclaimed from the Mangrove swamps and sea, with many fine buildings and road systems continually being built to modernise the city.

Out of the city it tells a different story. We spent a couple of days helping to prepare packages for the children of hostels/orphanages, then on the first weekend, we visited two, on the Saturday, St Maryanne Hostel Bantayan (built by the Rotary club of Sabah) a new home for teenage girls and Sunday we visited St Theresa's Hostel in Kota Marudo where there are 66 girls and boys currently in residence aged between 5-16. These are very poor areas and the children often don't get to go home much as the distance is just too great. ...it is not unheard of for a day long trip to go home. They gave us a great welcome with singing, and dancing with dances made up by the children including national dances. Lunch was provided by a member of the visiting group, of chicken and rice, and pizza with soft drinks. Afterwards the children all received a gift which this year included new sheet sets, school supplies and a new school bag. The gifts change depending on the needs of the particular hostel.

After more packing the following week, Saturday we visited St Maria Goretti Hostel for 70 girls, half an hour outside the city of Keningau, where we were welcomed with wonderful dances and singing. Again we had lunch and the giving of gifts, and then a quick trip to Keningau to attend Mass which the Bishop concelebrated with 6 other priests in Maylasian, (and the singing! – everyone sang!!) and attended a dinner for the Bishop to celebrate his 74th Birthday. There was lots of singing and dances performed by groups from different parts of the diocese, and 10-12 cakes- a birthday cake from each parish.

Our final hostel for the weekend at Bondulu children's home built by Rotary on donated land at Toboh a little village near Tambunan. This hostel houses 70 children from 5-16 both boys and girls, but the Sisters had two little girls as well one about 2 ½ years of age, and one 8 months old. The numbers fluctuate depending on family situations. The children are responsible for their own washing and are very practiced at tidying up the common area once meals are finished.

These hostels are run by the nuns of the Franciscan order of Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, a local order. Some children are orphans, some have family difficulties, some it's a matter of large distances and a needed education.

It was wonderful to be able to travel to these areas and see the agricultural practices which are still being used today. Rice grown in small plots with water still in the plot, and trees growing Dragon Fruit at the sides as well as avocado trees. Every bit of land is used. These areas seem to be more productive and the houses are in better condition than in the north. Most people don't have transport, so the churches are built very closely together, so people can walk to them.

There are another two hostels visited by Gordet & Jane and friends, they sponsor 200 of the 420 children in total. The Dickson Rotary in Canberra is starting a trust to donate to these hostels and will be having a fund raising event at Spence on 9 September 2023. Laurence De Costa of St Monica's Church is currently the person to speak with for this. All donations via Rotary are tax deductible.

This trip has been an amazing adventure for me, and it was wonderful to see Christian charity being lived daily, by some very amazing and humble nuns, helped in their daily struggles by people who have big hearts.

Finance Update

Parish Financial Facts That We Need To Be Aware Of That Are Highlighted In The Statistics Below

In speaking to some parishioners, there seem to be a perception that the Parish is still producing substantial profits as it once did in the past, however, this is far from the truth. With the declining mass attendances and reduction of Planned Givers and Pledged Amounts, the "glory" years of the past, where we achieved surpluses of over \$100,000, have truly vanished. As we move from a time of newly constructed buildings and are now entering the cycle of replacement, repairs and maintenance, we can expect ongoing substantial expenditure in this area for many years to come.

In view of this ever changing financial climate, where everyone is experiencing little growth in income and substantial growth in expenses, the Parish is no exception so with known decreases in income and increases in expenditure we have found it necessary to revise our original budget for the 2023 year, which now estimates a small surplus of \$6,812. This is not an attempt to frighten anyone, but simply keeping you abreast of the Parish's current financial position.

Overall, our income so far this year, is a little above budget, however planned giving continues to decline. Other, smaller sources of income, such as the Piety Stall, are providing some modest offset. Expenditure is right on budget for the year to date, but, along with the rising cost of living we all face, we expect to incur higher expenses.
