An Easter Message from Fr Troy

During lent we have been reflecting on the masks we wear and the reasons we do so! Traditionally, Lent is a time for transformation and conversion. Lent provides the Sabbath time we need to stop, reflect and ponder life's mysteries - a time in face, for entering the desert and there seeking God. Lent provides

the breathing space for self-examination and for renewal.

At the first Easter, as the women come to the tomb, they're wondering who's going to roll the big stone away because these stones were big. But then when they get to the tomb, they find that the stone has already been rolled away. And that goes to the heart of Easter. Because Easter is about rolling away all the stones or removing the masks that we wear that seem unmovable and block the way into life. Because unless the stone is moved, Jesus can't get out of the tomb, and we can't get into the tomb.

But once the stone is rolled away, Jesus comes towards us, and we can go into the tomb. And when we do, what we see are the grave cloths, we're told, in the gospel story. We see the linen cloths that had wrapped the body of Jesus and even his head. And those grave cloths are our old fears and anxieties and angers and depressions, all those death things in us. They are simply rolled up in a corner of an empty tomb.

So may Easter be for you, whoever you are, and whatever the big stones might seem to be. May it be a moment when the stone is rolled away and Jesus comes towards you saying, peace. And when you can look into an empty tomb and see that the things of death have become the things of life. Happy Easter.

We Are Witnesses

Mary runs to the tomb, heart racing at the sight of a stone rolled away. She imagines Jesus has been taken by enemies, and the thought propels her through the darkness. Next it's Peter and another disciple who are running, on fire with the idea that the tomb has been defiled. All of the characters in this story anticipate the



worst, their hearts set on bad news. But what they find, when they lift their eyes, is the best news ever.

John presents one of the main characters in this event in a peculiar way: "the other disciple." Why would this person remain nameless and indistinct, if he were one of only three people privileged to stand at the tomb on Easter morning? Scholars suggest John invites us to put ourselves in the silhouette if "the other disciple," for we too stand at the tomb and declare what we see from here. Is the empty tomb bad news, the work of an enemy, a sad end to a tragic story? Or do we "see and believe," finding the good news that even in the cemetery, death loses? What we see in the dark, we must speak with our whole lives. Happy Easter.

What brings life out of death in your experience?

Pray

O God, may the empty tomb remind us of the unexpected ways that justice, compassion, and healing can be brought to the most difficult and troubling circumstances. With the Spirit of Christ we hold these things open. Amen.

Ponder

Don't be afraid. Feel free to be astonished. Jesus is risen, angels are singing, and death just lost its sting. There's nothing to lose now. We can be as brave as we dare, risk all that we have. No matter what they tell you, the tomb is empty. The reign of death is over, We can go now. Become an Easter witness. Carry light into the darkness of someone you know, with a word of hope, a warm meal, an answer to prayer. When Christ (your real life, remember) shows up again on this earth, you'll show up, too – the real you, the glorious you.

Kids' Corner

You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. (Mark 16: 6)

Early in the morning, the women set out to anoint Jesus' body. I'm not sure I'd have the courage to go with them. After all, they're going to a tomb. That's where dead people are. And Jesus has died a terrible death on the Cross. I think I'd be scared. But when the women arrive at Jesus' tomb, they find nothing dead there. Instead, an angel is waiting for them! The angel tells them that Jesus is risen from the dead. Jesus is alive. Of course! With Jesus, there is no reason to be afraid. With Jesus, there is life and joy forever!

Enter Your Tomb

I have a friend who suffered abuse as a child. As an adult, the abuse caused problems for her relationships. It also led her to self-destructive behaviour, like addiction and promiscuity.

But then she entered her "tomb" and found that God wanted to raise her like he raised Jesus.

We all live with tombs, where parts of us have died. Memories of being hurt. Memories of hurting others. Selfdestructive behaviours. Our world has tombs too. Pockets of war and poverty. Nursing homes or hospitals where the old and sick line alone.

But God removed the rock from Jesus' tomb and raised him. By doing that, God told all humanity that there is new life after the painful things we have suffered through. But you have to enter the tomb to see and believe.

We do that by facing our painful memories and mistakes. We allow ourselves to cry when recalling how we've been hurt instead of gutting it out. We apologise instead of being proud. We also do that by facing our world's pain. We turn toward the people and places that many people ignore because they are afraid or too busy. We turn toward then whether they live in our homes, neighbourhoods or in different countries.

But we don't have to enter these tombs alone. We can bring God's power with us. We bring it when we pray or seek guidance from the Scriptures about our painful memories or mistakes. We bring it when we seek help from friends, family, or professionals. We bring it when we respond to our world's pain with Jesus' compassion and non-violence.

My friend entered her tomb. She sought help from counsellors and her faith to face the abuse she suffered. As a result, she is now a stronger and happier person who makes a real difference in the lives of others.

Once again, God rolled back the stone and raised someone to new life. Jesus' Resurrection was only the beginning. I've seen and I believe. www.gpbs.com.au
